What is Informed Practise -- Critical Thinking desires a Reflexive Analytical Imagination

- The story 'WE' influenced George Orwell's '1984', a society in which everyone is a number and live in rigid timetables, everyone lives in glass so they cannot hide form the state spies. There is glass around the city to exterminate and hide outside nature, they live on synthetic food, wear identical uniforms, any recreation is uniform and what the state wants them to do.
- '...you are sick. And the name of your sickness is fantasy. Fantasy is the last barricade on the road to happiness.' -- French Philosopher Jean Baudrillard 1990 'We once lived in a world where the realm of the imaginary was governed by the mirror, by dividing one into two, by theatre, by otherness an alienation. Today that realm is the realm of the screen, of interfaces and duplication, of proximity and networks.'
- 'if there is no more mirroring, there is also no possibility of getting to the other side of the mirror, no possibility of escape...in part because our world and the other world have fatally fused.' there is no such thing as escapism anymore as phones, games, etc are normal and no longer a form of escape. Personal thoughts on AI -- AI Art is without creative fulfilment of the journey

<u>Technical Determinism</u> – causal link between new technology and changes in society and culture.

<u>Technological Imaginary</u> – framework in which to understand the role of the imagination as a user-led determinant of the meaning of technology.

The imaginative/technology removes obstacles to desire the role of the imagination is not only to reflect upon them the world but to become the world.

Machines are not just technology, they repositories meaning imagination, technology and desire – are a non-redactable matrix of histories.

(the post digital membrane – Pepperell & Punt 2000)

It is **our imaginations** are what makes us Human

- 1) How we relate to tools and technology (in particular AI)
- 2) How we relate to our our governments and our governments to us (media, matter, nature, ecology our life-support systems)
- 3) Stories about the future and how they relate to the present

Thomas More (advisor to King Henry 8th) wrote a book called 'Utopia' (meaning a good place, however in Latin means 'nowhere')— when Henry the 8th ruled, he brought the state and religion together

There are two types of Utopias:

Carnivalesque Utopia = Carnivalesque is a literary mode that subverts and liberates the assumptions of the dominant style or atmosphere through humour and chaos. It originated as "carnival" in Mikhail Bakhtin's Problems of Dostoevsky's Poetics and was further developed in Rabelais and His World. Mikhail Bakhtin, a Russian linguist and literary critic writing in the first half of the 20th century, used this term to characterize writing that depicts the de-stabilization or reversal of power structures, albeit temporarily, as happens in traditional forms of carnival.

Austere Utopia = (cant find it online)

Utopian = a representation of the ideal state / society / commonwealth **Sci- fi** = a sub-genre of this in which scene and technology predominate thematically

What if – from science fiction to Speculative Fictions to Speculative Fabulations
Science Fact complimentary to SF as it is the storytelling practice of everyday people
((mothers, kids in playground etc.) and are the fabels / worlding / creatures of the imagination / impossible worlds that will allow us to survive in the future.

Dystopian art is a human response to what is seen. We can speak about 'creative practice' but what does that mean: the *way of seeing* that the artist must cultivate, one that does not separate *meaning from experience*.

It always celebrates human freedom: the struggle to free ourselves.

Alternative universes are really devices for embarrassing the present, as Imaginary cultures are used to estrange and unsettle our own.
